CIEE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Dear Colleague:

The thirty-sixth Annual Conference of the Council on International Educational Exchange will be held in Washington, D.C. on November 2nd, 3rd and 4th. The theme of the Conference will be "Building Exchanges: The Impact of the International Youth Exchange Initiative". The Conference will focus on recent governmental efforts to expand youth exchanges and will feature extensive participation of senior representatives of the U.S. and foreign governments, the educational community, and the public and private sectors.

Several plenary sessions will be devoted to an examination of President Reagan's International Youth Exchange Initiative and its implications for the field of educational exchange. Representatives of the U.S. Government will outline the progress of the Initiative to date. Representatives of the governments of Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan and the United Kingdom will report on their efforts to increase exchanges with the United States in the context of the Initiative and the Economic Summit Meetings. New financial support in the private sector and volunteer support in the communities will also be outlined.

In addition, plenary sessions will feature other major topics that are currently under discussion in the field. The meaning of "Excellence in International Educational Exchange" will be explored. Claiborne Pell, Senator from Rhode Island, will discuss "U.S. National Policy and International Educational Exchange". A panel of Washington-based experts will report on other relevant developments in the nation's capital. A series of workshops will examine prospects for exchanges with the non-western world, international opportunities for vocational and technical education in community and junior colleges, the participation of disabled persons in international educational exchange, developments in student travel services,


new audio-visual resource materials and reports on current research in the field.

William H. Allaway, Director, Education Abroad Program, University of California and Chairman of the Council on International Educational Exchange, will deliver the keynote address at the Annual Membership Luncheon. Finally, J. W. Fulbright, the distinguished former Senator from Arkansas, will close the Conference with a major address.

The Conference will also include a number of special features. A pre-Conference workshop, "The Basics of Youth Exchanges", will provide an intensive introduction to the field of youth exchanges for individuals and organizations new to the field. Conference participants will be assisted in making representations on behalf of the field to members of the House of Representatives and the Senate while in Washington. Embassies of the Economic Summit nations will be invited to host Conference participants. In addition to formal sessions, informal activities will allow participants to mingle, both socially and professionally.

This year's Conference will offer a special opportunity to explore the role of government in educational exchange. This topic has emerged as a central issue in recent years and will figure largely in developments in the field in the next decade. We invite you to join us in Washington this November.

The Council on International Educational Exchange is a private, non-profit, membership organization, incorporated in the United States, with international offices, affiliations and representation. Major responsibilities and contributions to the field of educational exchange, throughout its 36 years of service to the academic community, have established the Council as one of the foremost organizations concerned with international education and student travel.

The Council was founded in 1947 by a small group of organizations active in the field of international education and student travel in order to help reestablish student exchange after World War II. In its early years the Council chartered ocean liners for transatlantic student sailings, arranged group air travel and organized orientation programs to prepare students and teachers for their educational experiences abroad. Over the years the Council's mandate broadened dramatically with the ever-increasing number of its academic members whose interests spread beyond Europe to Africa, Asia and Latin America. Today, the Council assumes important educational responsibilities and develops, facilitates and administers programs of international educational exchange throughout the world on behalf of both its national and international constituencies.

The Council is governed by a Board of Directors elected from representatives of its 164 member institutions and national exchange organizations. Membership is open to nonprofit organizations and academic institutions that either conduct educational exchange programs or provide services and assistance to organizations conducting such programs. Full membership status is awarded to applicants after they complete a systematic self-evaluation of their international programs or services that have been operative for at least two years.

The Council offers its members many benefits, including: a vehicle for professional development and research; representation of member concerns at national and international levels; worldwide contacts with governmental and private sectors; assistance in the establishment and strengthening of international exchange programs in a nationally distributed publication.

The Council's programs and services are administered by its main office in New York, through regional administrative centers in New York, Paris and Tokyo, ten services offices in the United States and twelve service or study-center offices in Europe and Asia.

Program Notes

"The Basics of Youth Exchanges": A Pre-Conference Workshop

A special pre-Conference workshop will be held on Wednesday, November 2nd, from 8:00 a.m. to noon immediately preceding the first sessions of the Conference. The workshop is designed to provide a four-hour intensive introduction to the field of youth exchanges for individuals and organizations that are new to the field. The workshop will follow a "potpourri" format, in which a wide variety of topics will be dealt with in rapid succession. Participants will be introduced to basic topics and issues and will also become acquainted with the standard resources and materials necessary for further professional development. The workshop will be chaired by Jon Booth, Director, International Study and Travel Center, University of Minnesota. Presenters will be drawn from members of the Council and will include experts in the field. Individuals may register for the workshop only or may attend both the workshop and the Conference.

Capitol Hill Visits

Conference participants are encouraged to visit their legislative representatives on Capitol Hill while attending the Conference. Participants who pre-register will be sent an information sheet outlining current legislative issues related to international educational exchange that can be used to prepare for such visits. The information will also be available at the Conference registration desk. The Conference program suggests that the visits be made on Wednesday morning, November 2nd, immediately prior to the first session.
