what you'll learn

The Language and Culture summer program is designed to help students develop their Portuguese language skills and to expose them to Portuguese culture through a brief, but intensive immersion experience. This is achieved through courses in Portuguese language and culture and through field trips and excursions.

thoughts from abroad

Lisbon is a hilly city, and every hill looks down on the blue waters of the Tagus River. Lisboetas share an openness that is nurtured by the city's proximity to the Atlantic. These days, the city that once sent the first European ships around Africa's southern cape to India and Japan receives more people than it sends out.

about lisbon

Lisbon is the westernmost capital in mainland Europe, at the point where the Tagus River flows into the Atlantic. Built on seven hills, Lisbon is navigated by funicular trains, an elevator, trams, buses, and the metro. The city presents interesting contrasts, from tiny one-of-a-kind shops with fading facades to mega malls; from narrow, steep, cobbled-stoned streets to wide-open vistas. Lisbon's fascinating past can be seen in the faces of its multicultural citizens, its food, its architecture, and its welcoming attitude towards foreigners.

academics

Academic Program

The Language and Culture summer program focuses on two interwoven areas: Portuguese language and Portuguese culture and history. Special emphasis is placed on Lisbon within a broad global context. All courses include experiential activities and field visits. Students may participate in one three-week session starting in early June, one three-week session starting in late June, or both.

Academic Culture

All courses meet daily, Monday through Friday, for three hours. The academic calendar includes dates for mandatory trips scheduled out of Lisbon. This hands-on learning experience contributes greatly to the student's experience abroad. Instruction is interactive and dynamic. Many lectures take place in situ, so that students can feel part of the culture they are studying.

While extracurricular activities and personal travel contribute greatly to the student's overall European experience, attendance is mandatory for all classes and required events. Early departure for and/or late return from personal trips on weekends is not permitted. Any extended travel should take place prior to the start of the program or upon completion of the program.

Nature of Classes

Participants take classes with other CIEE students only.

Language Environment

As students gain proficiency in Portuguese, resident staff encourage them to use their language skills in everyday settings. This fosters a learning community that contributes to both Portuguese language proficiency and understanding of Portuguese society.

Grading System

Students are normally graded on the basis of class participation, papers, small quizzes, and a final examination. Language courses normally have quizzes and at least two examinations. With attendance mandatory, unexcused absences are reflected in a participant's final grade. Class participation is essential in most courses; some courses require students to complete special individual projects, which they present in class.



where you'll study

The Universidade Nova de Lisboa (UNL) is a public institution of higher learning founded in 1977 with the goal of contributing to the renewal of higher education in Portugal. It has five faculties, including the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities (FCSH), where the Language and Culture summer program is primarily based. FCSH is a multidisciplinary unit that promotes diversity of knowledge, creativity, and freedom of thought. Facilities at FCSH include a central library, computer facilities, student association, drama group, and a bookstore.

living**Housing and Meals**

Students are housed in a student *residencia* on the Campolide campus within walking distance to FCSH, where classes take place. The *residencia* is a modern facility in which students live in single and double rooms with private bathrooms. There are kitchens, laundry facilities, study rooms, a common room, and a computer room with wireless Internet. The student *residencia* also houses a bookstore, photocopy services, and the Student Law Association. Meals are not included in the program fee and are the responsibility of the student.

Orientation

The two-day orientation session conducted in Lisbon at the beginning of the program introduces students to the city, the culture, and the academic program, as well as provides practical information about living in Lisbon. Ongoing support is provided on an individual and group basis throughout the program.

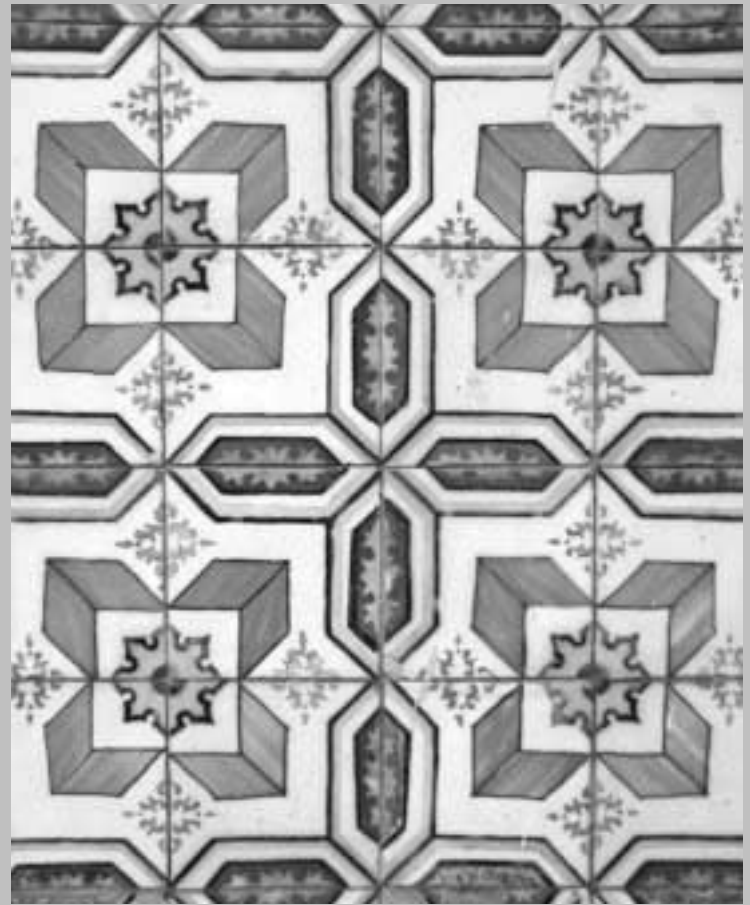
Internet

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities has wireless Internet, as does the student *residencia*. There are also computer rooms at both sites. Students are encouraged to bring wireless-enabled laptops.

culture**Cultural Activities and Field Trips**

Lisbon is a culturally rich city with a vibrant theater life, a historic opera house, many museums, concert venues, galleries, and a dynamic cinemathèque. Students are encouraged to take advantage of the city's cultural offerings, such as its summer festivals.

One weekend excursion and one day trip are included in each three-week session. Destinations for weekend trips may include Évora, Porto, and Coimbra. Destinations for day trips may include Sintra, Mafra, and Óbidos.

Credit

Total recommended credit per session is 3 semester/4.5 quarter hours and 6 semester/9 quarter hours for two sessions.

Course contact hours are 45 hours and recommended credit is 3 semester/4.5 quarter hours per course, unless otherwise indicated.

Students are placed into the appropriate language class upon arrival based on the results of a placement test and their language background. Portuguese language courses are offered at all levels. The beginner levels aim to provide students basic language skills to help them ease their way into life in Lisbon. Intermediate and advanced courses cover more specific aspects of grammar and syntax, as well as formal and informal discourse, providing students the fundamental communication skills they will need to more fully blend into Portuguese society. All courses refer to topics related to Portuguese culture as a basis for teaching.

CIEE Content Courses

AHIS 3001 LISU

Lisbon: A Journey from Olisipo to the Present

(In English, Session I)

How did Lisbon achieve its present form? This course covers the history of Lisbon from Roman times to the present, analyzing selected aspects of urbanism, architecture, sculpture, and painting and their relationship with their particular historic context. Students have direct contact with documents by reading primary sources and analyzing the works of art in loco. This course enhances students' understanding of Portuguese art history and gives them tools to read any work of art.

HIST 3001 LISU

Contemporary Portugal: Identity and Nationalism through Literature, Film, and Music

(In English, Session II)

This course provides a general overview of Portuguese modern urban culture. The selected topics follow a chronological order from the end of the 19th Century to present day. The objects of analysis vary from literature to cinema, among other products of mass culture, thus allowing for an inclusive reading of culture in its social, historical, and political context.
